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From the Manager Regional Library

It's my pleasure to lead the Richmond-Upper Clarence Regional Library in the delivery of public library services to the communities of the Kyogle and Richmond Valley regions. Becoming the fourth manager in the Library's 47 year history is a significant changing of the guard, taking over from our previous manager, Gary Ellem, who had worked in this role from 1997-2024. I thank Gary for his mentorship and for taking the care and time he did in helping me understand both the historical context of our library service, and the future vision he hoped for our community.

Our public library service continues to be more than simply buildings containing books, (although any building filled with books is a quality building in my personal opinion). We encompass four buildings, a truck, a smaller van, and 18 team members across our region. Together we create spaces where community members and visitors can spend time; whether that's relaxing, working, studying, or completing life admin. tasks, which we facilitate by providing access to computers, laptops, printers, and WiFi.

Our library's physical and digital collections strive to continually provide our community with an array of diverse, inclusive, and current content, keeping in mind accessibility to language and learning by including resources in dyslexic-friendly print, large print, audiobooks, graphic novels, and most recently, the addition of resources published in Braille. We also provide access to online encyclopedias and information databases to ensure our community can gain access to accurate and current information in an age where information overload and fake news is pervasive.



Our team deliver programs and events for community members of all ages, both in our buildings, and through outreach to other organisations. In doing so, we nurture language and literacy - including information and digital literacy, as well as providing creative outlets for connection and well-being for our community.

At a time of decreasing literacy rates in Australia, and the potential social impact to the community as artificial intelligence technology becomes embedded into many aspects of our everyday life, the Richmond-Upper Clarence Regional Library team strive to remain responsive to the future needs of our community. Throughout these changes we will continue to provide a safe, welcoming space to access books, resources, information, and technology, so that everyone, no matter their life situation and circumstances, can be an active and connected citizen.





Our Collection

Physical Collection

New additions to the Regional Library physical collection this year included:

- Braille Learning Kit which includes magnetic balls and practice
- Wonderbooks Picture books with an attached pre-loaded audio
- Robotics STEM kits kits including instructions and components to create and control electronic robots.
- Book Club Sets sets of 10 copies of a book and associated discussion questions for members to be able to hold a book club at home.

A range of approved public library suppliers are utilised for the majority of library acquisitions. A smaller number of items are purchased through additional websites and from independent and self-published creators whose works fall within the guidelines of the library's Collection Development Policy.

Standing orders for new titles published by our most popular fiction authors were utilised to ensure the community continually had access to new release popular titles as they were published.

Donated items were assessed against the Library's Collection Development Policy. Any items not added to the collection, as well as any withdrawn library collection resources, were sold in library book sale events, utilised in pop-up libraries, or donated to local

groups such as op shops.

There was a 3.2% increase in loans from the library's physical collection during the 2024/25 year.

The collections with increased loans included:

While libraries are expanding into the digital space, offering programs and meeting spaces; our physical collection remains one of our core services. With a passionate team dedicated to collection maintenance and development, our shelves always look fresh, with a diverse range of topics, voices, and formats available to our community.

Two projects for this last year included re-envisioning how w present our Junior Nonfiction and DVD collections.








Over the last year, we investigated different approaches used for junior nonfiction collections in other libraries and adapted them for our community. We reorganised these items into seven key themed collections (Animals, People, Places, Make, Tales, Facts, Science), retaining their Dewey call number, identifying each item with a genre spine label, shelving them within their collection, and creating more visual signage to make discovering similar topics easier.

Our Collection

Digital Collection

The Regional Library's digital collection currently includes eBooks, eAudiobooks, eComics, eMagazines, streamed music, tv shows, movies, and documentaries.


The use of physical audiobooks has decreased steadily over recent years, which has been partly affected by the availability of CD players, both portable and in new vehicles, and the removal of disc drives from laptops and computers. However, the rise in use of eAudiobooks is far exceeding that drop, with a 27% increase in loans of eAudiobooks in the 2024/25 year.

The Regional Library is part of a consortia with Clarence Regional Library with two eResource providers, and a NSW state-wide consortia for an additional two eResource providers, which enables our library service to provide a much wider range of content to the community.

We provide digital resources through a number of different apps to enable the library to offer a wider range of content to the community. This decision is due to constraints associated with current digital publishing rights and lending conditions, where in some cases, a specific publisher will often retain sole rights to a specific authors digital content or place an embargo on its availability.

Our collection now provides access to a combination of pay-per-use content, one-user per loan content (which is limited by the publisher by the number of borrows or length of time the library can provide access), and multi-user content that allows up to 100 people to borrow an item at one time. The library team strives to provide access to as wide a range of content whilst getting the best value for money for the community.





Additional Borrowing Services

Whilst the Regional Library team strives to provide access to as many resources as possible, the team still receive requests for titles and items not owned by the Library.

To help bridge this gap the Library provides a Suggestion for Purchase service, where community members can recommend titles to be added to the collection. After assessment, if the items are purchased, the item will be reserved for the person who requested the title.

For items that are an older publication, or outside the Library's policies, the team participates in an Australia-wide interlibrary loan service, where the Regional Library can obtain a copy of the resource, from another library within Australia for our member to loan. In addition, we help fulfill requests for other libraries to support their members getting access to the titles they need.



Book Sales

We regularly sell books as part of our service, offering items that are being removed from our collection for purchase at our libraries. These sales provide an opportunity for the community to pick up affordable reads while supporting our library programs. During 2024–25, we received \$2,259 in book sales.

Our Programs and Events

During the 2024–25 year, the Regional Library delivered over 1,000 programs and events for the second consecutive year. These programs supported a wide range of outcomes including literacy and lifelong learning, digital inclusion, personal development, and wellbeing. From storytime sessions and tech help to author talks and creative workshops, our programming continues to reflect the diverse needs and interests of our communities.

Programs were held both onsite at our library branches, including through the Mobile Library and at various community locations across the Richmond Valley and Kyogle regions. This outreach approach reinforces that our library is far more than just a physical space with shelves; it is a dynamic, responsive service embedded in the heart of the community.

In October 2024, we transitioned to a new online booking platform, making it easier for community members to locate and book library spaces independently. Since this change, the meeting rooms at both Casino and Evans Head Libraries have seen a 36% increase in community bookings. These spaces are now regularly used by not-for-profit organisations, support groups, legal and health services, and individuals seeking a quiet place for work or study. Playdough Playtime Program




Playdough Playtime is one of our regular children's programs aimed at children 2 – 5 years old and their parents/carers.

It is a monthly program run by Library team member Tamara Patino and it is now in its seventh year, having started at Casino Library in August 2018.

Each month we gather in the children's area with a theme (usually inspired by, or gathered from previous conversations and interests had with our playdough playtime participants). Our playdough and accompanying loose parts, tools and resources are organised on the tables as an invitation to play and in a way to encourage sharing and development of social skills.

As we flatten, mould, pinch, squeeze, roll, snip and converse our way through Playdough Playtime we know we are building and strengthening our little hand and finger muscles whilst fostering a real sense of curiosity and creativity.

The children, the parents/carers as well as our library team members all enjoy the calming effect and learning through play experience that our Playdough Playtime offers (so much so that we aren't sure who enjoys it most- the children or the grown-ups!)



Djanangmum Preschool Storytime Program

Every Wednesday, educators bring a group of 10-14 preschoolers to the Casino Library for storytime. This partnership between the Library and the Preschool acknowledges the value of community connection and supports recognition of the use of the Galibal language in our spaces.

Our storytime program is designed to foster a lifelong love of books and reading in a fun way.

Each one-hour session follows a theme that often coincides with the Preschool's area of learning. Multi-sensory engagement is encouraged with the use of pop-up books, story props, rhymes, songs, puppets, craft, STEM, and tactile play.

So what are the benefits?

- Pop-up books create a sense of wonder and visually enhance the story
- props bring the story to life visually and encourage participation
- rhymes and songs support early literacy and numeracy skills
- puppets support language skills and imaginative play
- craft encourages individual interpretations of the story and its characters
- STEM and tactile play encourage conversations through spontaneous experiences.

At the end of each session, the Djanangmum show off their craft and chat to everyone they pass on the way out. As they wave goodbye, there's a chorus of 'What are we doing next week?' Yes, they had a wonderful time, and we're instilling a love of libraries and reading, one storytime session at a time.






Kyogle Library Book Group

I'm pleased to report Kyogle Library's book group is going well and steadily growing. From a core of six to eight regular members each month through to 10 regular members in 2025 as we welcomed new members. The members are all lovely folk who come together the third Tuesday of each month at 10.30am to share their reading, listening, and viewing experiences, as well each other's company. I've witnessed the development of confidence of our members to openly share opinions and offer honest reviews. I've also seen friendships grow, newcomers to our area warmly welcomed, encouragement of members feeling shy to be a part of the group by sitting-in or reviewing, as well giving care and support.

We've been very fortunate to welcome a number of fantastic local authors and guests including Annika Johansson, Gary Davis, P.A. Thomas, Tony Howley, J. Mary Masters, Maggie Walters, Kate & Jol Temple, and Matt Stanton.

We've also celebrated Senior's Festival at Book Group with lots of fun and games whilst learning helpful tips from Mark Poole from NBN Co who talked about cyber safety awareness for seniors. We've also enjoyed Literary Mocktails, played games for prizes and took home fab go-bags full of handy information courtesy of the State Library of NSW's Drug Info Kit's housed at all Richmond-Upper Clarence Regional Library branches. It was a great year for Book Group at Kyogle Library but 2025-26 will be even bigger and more fun! Everyone welcome!




Tech Savvy Program

The purpose of the Tech Savvy program is to provide one-on-one support with technology issues. For example, using a smartphone, tablet, or laptop.

Richmond-Upper Clarence Regional Library has multiple staff members who participate in the program over the region, which allows us to provide a variety of available session times. Each staff member has their own unique strengths with the different aspects of technology, and this gives our team a great knowledge base to utilise and support one another with.

As technology changes and advances, we have seen different trends appear in the community and we are always learning alongside patrons. In the past year the common themes that have emerged and staff have helped with are identifying and avoiding scams, lodging online forms (passport renewals, police checks etc), cloud-based storage options, using digital library resources, setting up and using email, password recovery, social media apps and file transfers.

When conducting Tech Savvy sessions, we aim to emphasise that even though our staff members are not experts in every area of technology we endeavour to help each person to the best of our ability. A technology issue may seem simple to one person, but it can be distressing to another and being able to help people understand or solve these issues is a rewarding aspect of working at the library.





Our Services

Our community and our members will always remain at the heart of everything we do. The Regional Library provides far more than books. We offer a wide range of services designed to support learning, connection, and everyday life.

In addition to our physical and digital collections, and the delivery of over 1,000 programs and events this year, our team supports the community through:

Information and Customer Support

Staff assist with printing, scanning, completing online forms, accessing government services, and conducting research, including local history inquiries.

Technology Access and Support

We provide free access to WiFi, public computers, laptops, and tablets. Our Tech Savvy one-on-one appointments help community members navigate smartphones, email, online safety, and digital library resources.

Mobile Library Services

Our Mobile Library visits 21 locations across the Richmond Valley and Kyogle regions, including schools and remote communities, ensuring equitable access to library services.

At-Home Library Services

We deliver books and resources fortnightly to 12 home library members and provide bulk loans to two organisations and one school, supporting those unable to visit a branch.



Device and Equipment Loans

Members can borrow tablets and access gaming consoles at Casino Library. We also offer 18 laptops for onsite use across three branches.

Community Partnerships and Outreach

We collaborate with local organisations to deliver outreach programs such as storytime sessions at Bentley Community Preschool and early literacy visits to Jumbunna Community Preschool.

Social and Wellbeing Initiatives

Programs like Playdough Playtime, Bookworms, book discussion groups and adult colouring in promote creativity, literacy, and social connection. We also support initiatives like Share the Dignity and It's in the Bag, helping deliver period care products to those in need.

Spaces for Community Use

Our meeting rooms, especially at Casino and Evans Head Libraries, are used for telehealth appointments, legal services, support groups, and private study. Since launching our online booking platform in October 2024, bookings have increased by 36 percent.

Whether it's borrowing a book, attending a workshop, getting tech help, or simply finding a quiet space to work, our services are designed to meet the evolving needs of our community.





Our Team



The Richmond Upper Clarence Regional Library team is made up of 18 dedicated staff members who bring a wide range of skills, creativity, and care to our library service. Spread across four branches, a mobile library, and outreach locations, our team works collaboratively to deliver high-quality services that reflect the needs and interests of our diverse communities.

Our staff are passionate about literacy, inclusion, and lifelong learning. Whether it's helping someone navigate a new device, curating a themed book display, or running a storytime session, each team member contributes to making our libraries welcoming and responsive spaces.

The Regional Library team participate in a range of training opportunities each year to ensure they have current industry knowledge, as well as understanding the range of applications and resources the library provides to the community.

Looking Ahead - Key Projects and Initiatives

Casino Library Meeting Rooms

The Casino Library Meeting Room Project, funded by a 2022–23 NSW Public Library Infrastructure Grant, is nearing completion. This initiative will deliver three new meeting rooms, significantly increasing the library's capacity to host programs, workshops, and community gatherings. The design of these spaces prioritises flexibility, accessibility, and comfort, ensuring they can be used for a wide range of purposes including quiet study and tutoring sessions to larger group meetings and creative activities.

The addition of these rooms responds directly to community feedback about the need for more shared spaces in Casino. By providing dedicated areas for collaboration and learning, the library strengthens its role as a community hub. These rooms will also support local organisations and services that rely on accessible venues for outreach and engagement, fostering stronger community connections.

Construction on the meeting rooms is due to be completed late

Mobile Library Replacement

In 2024–25, the Regional Library was awarded a \$500,000 NSW Public Library Infrastructure Grant to replace its 11-year-old mobile library vehicle. This funding will allow us to design and build a modern, accessible mobile library that better meets the needs of our rural and remote communities. The new vehicle will feature improved technology, climate control, and flexible shelving to accommodate a wider range of materials and programs.

The mobile library is a lifeline for residents who live far from a physical branch, offering access to books, digital resources, and library staff. With this upgrade, we'll be able to expand our outreach, improve service reliability, and create a more welcoming experience for users of all ages. It's a vital investment in equitable access to information and lifelong learning across the region.

New Website and Domain

The Regional Library is currently in the planning stages of launching its own domain and a brand-new website. This digital transformation will streamline access to library services, making it easier for users to browse the catalogue, register for events, and explore digital resources. The new site will be designed with accessibility and mobile responsiveness in mind, ensuring a smooth experience for all users. This project reflects our commitment to evolving with the needs of our users in an increasingly digital world.
