NEW RAPPVILLE COMMUNITY HALL OPENED

Richmond Valley Mayor Robert Mustow, former Governor General and BizRebuild Chair Sir Peter Cosgrove and Federal Member for Page Kevin Hogan officially opened the stunning new Rappville Community Hall in front of a large crowd of well wishers.

The rebuilding of the hall is a major milestone for the ongoing recovery efforts following the 2019 bushfire disaster.

The construction of the new hall was one of Council's key priorities in the wake of the devastating bushfire, which tore through Rappville and its surrounds on Tuesday 8 October, destroying the original hall and homes, as well as damaging several others.

In developing the plans for the new hall, located on what is now called the Rappville Common, Council has been fortunate to work with BizRebuild, a bushfire-recovery initiative of the Business Council of Australia.

The \$1.5 million project was funded by BizRebuild's Community Rebuilding Trust, the Australian Government's National Bushfire Recovery Agency and Richmond Valley Council, resulting in a much-improved space for the community to use.

Designed by award-winning Sydney architect Virginia Kerridge, the new hall includes a generous-sized hall and outdoor deck, a separate building housing a communal kitchen and supper room, along with a covered outdoor dining area, as well as storage and amenities areas.

COUNCIL'S PRIORITIES AND DELIVERY PROGRESS

This year will be a landmark year for Richmond Valley Council as it continues to rebuild after the 2022 floods, with one of the largest-ever infrastructure programs.

This includes significant road reconstruction and asset repairs across the Richmond Valley. Council has already made good progress in completing emergency works for its roads, drainage, water and sewerage networks and continues to seek further funding for repairs and upgrades. The recent \$2.1m grant for repairs of Coraki-Ellangowan Road was a welcome boost for this program.

Apart from flood recovery work, more than \$20m in signature projects will also be finalised this year, including the opening of Rappville Hall, Casino Memorial Pool and significant progress also scheduled for the Rail Trail project and Casino Showground redevelopment.


Further funding will be sought to progress other priority works, including the Woodburn CBD streetscape upgrade, Richmond Terrace at Coraki, Broadwater Bridge repairs, and upgrades to Woodburn-Evans Head and Woodburn-Coraki Road. Council also has plans for major sewage treatment plant upgrades for Evans Head and Casino.

This year will also see Council's long-term planning projects begin to unlock new housing, job and investment opportunities. The Richmond Valley Growth Management Strategy sets a path to increase our population to 27,650 by 2041, provide an additional 2,500 local homes and 600 new jobs through the Regional Job Precinct.

Council continues to work with the Northern Rivers Reconstruction Corporation to unlock more residential development on flood-safe lands in the Valley and will continue to advocate to all levels of Government for further assistance with flood recovery works.

Recovery progress report

Meanwhile, Council has completed the first six months of its Rebuilding the Richmond Valley interim delivery program, with a comprehensive progress report presented at last month's Council meeting.



The report recognises that flood recovery works will take at least three years to complete, with extensive damage to the Valley's road network and sewerage systems. The focus for the first six months has been on assessing the scale of the damage, completing emergency repairs, helping people to get back into their homes wherever possible and restoring essential community facilities.

The Recovery Plan sets out key strategies and activities for completing the program, while also continuing to provide Council's day to day services. Of the 88 principal activities in the program, four have been completed and 81 are currently on schedule, including restoring community facilities such as the Casino Sports Stadium, community halls, emergency services buildings and sports fields.

BUILDING BACK BETTER

Mayor Robert Mustow and General Manager Vaughan Macdonald met with NSW Minister for Regional Transport and Roads Sam Farraway and Member for Clarence Chris Gulaptis for the announcement of the Regional Roads and Transport Recovery Package.

The \$312.5m program, funded jointly by the NSW and Australian Governments, will ensure infrastructure will be rebuilt to a higher standard, making it more resilient to future disasters.

Minister Farraway announced Richmond Valley Council was successful in receiving \$3.02m for design solutions and construction of catch fencing, removal of debris and improving drainage on the northern upside of Naughtons Gap Road. The road rebuild is expected to be at least \$13m with Council seeking Natural Disaster Recovery funding.

Council will also receive \$1.98m to design and construct the installation of culverts at Dairy Flat on Woodburn-Coraki road.



RESILIENCE FUNDS

Richmond Valley Council will share \$50m in flood mitigation and recovery funding with six other North Coast councils following the first report from the CSIRO as part of the Northern Rivers Resilience Initiative.

All seven local affected councils will share the funding for these regional programs:

- \$3m for community flood risk awareness
- \$800,000 for regional and local floor level surveys
- \$1.2m for evacuation road infrastructure assessments

Richmond Valley Council will also receive funding for road and bridge drainage, with \$4.2m allocated to Woodburn-Coraki Road at Dairy Flat with improvements for better access during and post floods and \$1.47m allocated to Thearles Canal culvert upgrade to improve drainage.

Further tranches of the funding from the \$150m Commonwealth Emergency Response will be announced over the following six months, and Council continues to advocate all levels of government for funding for flood recovery work.
