NRLX ALL BREEDS SALE

MORE than 600 people attended the 25th Casino All Breeds Bull and Female Sale, which saw the top priced bull go under the hammer for \$18,000.

The popular annual sale, held at the Northern Rivers Livestock Exchange (NRLX) on Saturday 29 July, saw \$859,450 of livestock sold on the day, at an overall average of \$6366, including females.

The top priced bull was sold by Franklin Angus Stud, which saw its Franklin Raindance S20 go for \$18,000.

As part of the day, the NRLX team undertook extensive preparation for the annual sale to ensure the facility was in pristine condition for what is not only a key industry sale, but also a vital fundraising opportunity for local charities.

Donations of \$1000 each went to Westpac Rescue Helicopter Service, Windara, and Casino VRA.



COUNCIL MATTERS

At July's meeting, Council received a study on Casino's stormwater infrastructure, and a model created to assess impacts on our network within the Casino area.

This model is the first stage of assessment and assists Council to plan for upgrades to improve the management of stormwater.

Similar studies for stormwater modelling will also be undertaken for communities in the Mid-Richmond.

NEW FLOOD FUNDING

Last month, Mayor Robert Mustow joined Minister for Emergency Management Senator Murray Watt who announced 20 new projects across the North Coast worth \$100m.

These programs include funding raising the two low-set bridges at Tatham to improve access between Casino and Coraki during flood events, improving town drains at Woodburn and Coraki to minimise property damage and allow for quicker recovery following floods and other programs.

This announcement comes on top of a \$50m announcement previously, which included work at Dairy Flat on Woodburn-Coraki Road.

MASSIVE TENTH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATION FOR CASINO TRUCK SHOW

What a way to celebrate your 10th anniversary!

With the doubling of entrants, the 2023 North Coast Petroleum Casino Truck Show has claimed the title on the biggest truck show in the southern hemisphere, previously held by TMC Trailers Trucking Industry Show in Christchurch, New Zealand.

The official number of trucks judged was 580, however, around 40 missed the registration deadline so all up 620 bangers of all shapes and sizes filled the streets of Casino. This equates to more than \$300,000,000 in value.

Calculating attendees via the density check method found the 2023 NCP Casino Truck Show has eclipsed all records for attendance at a Richmond Valley single-day event, attracting a record turnout of 14,000.

The feedback coming through was overwhelmingly positive, with many drivers planning their 2024 rosters to make sure they don't miss what could be another history-making event.

ELLANGOWAN ROAD FIX

Work on the first 900m stage of upgrades on Coraki-Ellangowan Road is approaching completion, with an initial seal planned in the upcoming weeks weather permitting.

The work is funded from a \$2.1m Fixing Local Roads program grant and includes a co-contribution of \$651,000 from Council

The existing road has a significant number of potholes with several pavement failures and the upgrade will significantly improve safety and amenity for road users.

Council's Roads and Drainage construction crew will continue rehabilitation and reconstruction work across the 2.7km of the road extending from Ellangowan Road to Emu Park Road.

Once all three stages are finished, a final seal will be provided to complete the project.



CASINO POOL UPDATE

There has been some more exciting changes in the Casino Pool site over the past month as the finishing touches are applied to stage one of the \$6.5m upgrade funded by the Australian Government and Richmond Valley Council.

All-new shade structures have been installed at the ends of the 50m pool and splash pool, and the slide has been refurbished and reinstalled.

The all-ability access to the main pool is complete with a rail installed along the length of the ramp.

The pool has been filled with water, with the commissioning process of the pumps and heaters underway.

It won't be long until this magnificent upgraded facility will be available for the community to enjoy.



FIRST FOR JOB PRECINCT

It is a milestone moment for the Reynolds Road Industrial Precinct, with Council receiving the first DA to establish a business in the area.

Elecsome is the first solar panel upcyclers in Australia and provides a solution for the issue of damaged or end-of-life solar panels being sent to landfill.

Their patented process ensures a 97 percent recovery rate from solar panels sourced and picked up from across Australia. Some panels can be repaired and repurposed, while the glass panels are upcycled to sand/silica for premix concrete instead of river sand. Silicon can also be processed to PV/Battery grade for re-use, and other metals can enter other established recycling industry channels.

Elecsome has an established facility in Melbourne and already has \$21m in secured long-term contracts.

Council developed the nine industrial-zoned lots as an initiative to attract employment-generating industries to the Richmond Valley, and this application is an exciting moment in the economic growth of our area.
