## COUNCIL MATTERS

At last month's Council meeting, Mayor Robert Mustow presented a mayoral minute seeking assistance to accelerate repair work to the Casino Courthouse so it can be reopened.

The courthouse was severely damaged in last year's floods, meaning all court matters are now being heard in Lismore. This is placing strain on local police, court staff and the community having to travel to Lismore for hearings.

Council resolved to write to the Attorney General and our local member to bring the issue to the fore and reopen this important building in our community.

This month there will also be an extraordinary meeting of Council on Thursday 29 June at 6pm to consider Council's Community Strategic Plan, Delivery Program and Operational Plan and budgets.

# KEEPING BEACHES SAFE

Specialised long-range drones designed to improve responses to emergency situations, natural disasters and enhance safety both off the coast and along our beaches, will be trialled by Surf Life Saving NSW at Evans Head this month.

The long-range uncrewed aerial vehicle project, funded by the NSW Department of Primary Industries, will explore how the existing surveillance program could be extended to cover more of the NSW coastline.

The project will also trial how this new generation of drone could be used in other situations to enhance public safety away from the coast, such as during flood and bushfire emergencies as well as search and rescue operations.

The trial will simulate real-life scenarios, with the aim of safely operating different types of drones that are capable of flying further and for longer, by operating beyond visual line of sight.

Surf Life Saving's drone capability was used extensively during last year's floods, helping to give the NSW SES a more complete picture of the disaster unfolding across the State, and where support to communities could be best directed.

### IN BRIEF

#### Naughtons Gap road update

Council has received the final report of the geotechnical investigation to guide solutions for the reconstruction of Naughtons Gap Road.

Transport for NSW is reviewing the geotechnical assessment and recommended remediation report and will provide comment to Council. Once this is complete, final approval for the funding will occur and Council will tender the works.

A tender report will be tabled at the September Council meeting. Construction can commence immediately following the appointment of the successful contractor.

Reconstruction is expected to take up to 12 months to complete, with the aim of having the road open to the public by September 2024.

#### Community grants available

#### COUNCIL PLANS FOR RICHMOND VALLEY FUTURE

Richmond Valley Council's new Draft Community Strategic Plan (CSP) sets an ambitious growth agenda for 2040, including more people, housing, jobs and green spaces.

This document, along with Council's Draft Delivery Program 2023-25 and Draft Operational Plan 2023-24 will be presented for final adoption at this month's extraordinary meeting on Thursday 29 June.

These plans were created

through extensive consultation with the community and set key directions to ensure our communities are sustainable, that we protect our environment and use our natural resources wisely.

RICHMOND VALLEY 2040

By 2040, the Richmond Valley's population is expected to grow by 4000, creating some 2000 extra employment opportunities, including 600 direct jobs from the Regional Job Precinct. There are also plans to unlock flood-safe lands with room for 2000 new homes.

General Manager Vaughan Macdonald said the new CSP sets a pathway for steady, responsible growth in the Richmond Valley, which would provide much-needed homes for local families, more jobs for young people and more services and facilities for our towns and villages.

"There are many exciting initiatives ahead in the next 20 years as we finish the major works we've begun and open new opportunities for our Valley," Mr Macdonald said.

Meanwhile, the Draft Delivery Program and Operational Plan

2023-2024 acknowledges the challenges ahead, while maintaining vital community services.

The Draft Operational Plan, also referred to as the draft budget, includes a significant capital works program of around \$40 million, with a cash surplus of \$212,574 forecast for 2023-2024, followed by surpluses in the subsequent three years.

Mr Macdonald said the draft budget was challenging to produce, given the unpredictable economic environment.

Mr Macdonald said the draft budget ensured there was a focus on spending in the right areas and in the delivery of assets and projects which residents had called for.

He said Council was determined to continue delivering the services which kept Richmond Valley communities functioning, whilst rebuilding the local economy.

"Council has not been immune from the challenges of getting the number of skilled workers we need to conduct the critical work of delivering our capital and operational plans, nor have we been shielded from supply chain disruption and other inflationary pressures," Mr Macdonald said.

"Despite these challenges, our capital program continues to move forward, which is all part of our plan for future service delivery requirements and creating economic growth in the Richmond Valley."

"Council will continue to deliver services to make the Richmond Valley an even greater place to live and invest for a sustainable and prosperous future."
