SALES BACK AT NRLX

Following a thorough independent evaluation of leasing proposals for the Northern Rivers Livestock Exchange (NRLX) by renowned agribusiness leader JLL, Outcross Agri-Services Pty Ltd has taken over the facility's management for the next five years, with an option in its favour for an additional five years.

The Armidale-based company is Australia's largest saleyard service provider, involved in some of the biggest selling centres in the country including: Roma; Blackall; Dubbo; Forbes; Yass; Moss Vale; Mortlake; Hamilton; Yea; Naracoorte; and Mt Gambier.

General Manager Vaughan Macdonald said Outcross Agri-Services's experience and expertise were exactly what Council was looking for to ensure the NRLX continued to grow and prosper and retain its reputation as the leading saleyard facility in northern NSW.

Mr Macdonald said Council had worked hard with all levels of government to support the local beef industry and provide the capital investment and expertise required to develop the NRLX into a leading business facility, which reflected modern standards of safety, animal welfare and efficient operations.

With funding support from both the Australian and NSW governments, the NRLX now stands as testament to that commitment, having generated \$862 million in cattle sales since that time under Council's management.

Sales commenced at NRLX under Outcross on 2 February.

COUNCIL MATTERS

The Council adopted the Richmond Valley Disability Inclusion Action Plan at its December meeting.

WORK CONTINUING ON OUR ROAD NETWORK

Reconstruction work on the Naughtons Gap road landslip is set to start and run through to November, weather permitting.

The damage was caused by two natural disasters, and the council has worked tirelessly over the past three years to secure funding and design plans for the reconstruction of the road on its current alignment.

The area will experience more heavy vehicle traffic during the construction period.

Council and its contractors have already started realigning the northern section of the road in the past month (pictured below).

Additionally, Council has begun the renewal and raising of Willox Bridge on the Casino-Coraki road, with a side-lane detour in place under lights. The new bridge is expected to be completed in May.

A side track is now available for heavy vehicles on the Reynolds Road timber bridge, which was funded as part of the Fixing Country Bridges program.

The construction will begin at the end of February, with an opening date in June, weather permitting.

Similarly, work will commence shortly to replace the singlelane Lollback Creek Bridge on Old Lawrence Road, with funding from the same program.

Drainage work is ongoing on Woodburn Coraki Road to prepare for installing further culverts at Dairy Flat and Thearles Drain.

Council has also started a heavy patching program across its road network, with work beginning on Spring Grove Road and continuing to Manifold Road and Bentley Road.
