CHRISTMAS CLOSURES

Council offices and facilities will be closed across the Christmas and New Year period.

The Casino and Evans Head administration buildings will close at 3pm, Friday 22 December and reopen Tuesday 2 January.

Casino, Evans Head and Kyogle libraries will close at 3pm, on Friday 22 December. Casino and Kyogle libraries will reopen at 10am, Tuesday 2 January. Evans Head Library will reopen at 8.30am, Tuesday 2 January.

Coraki Library will close at 5pm, Thursday 21 December and re-open at 2pm, Tuesday 2 January.

The Mobile Library will cease operations for the year at Woodenbong at 12noon, Friday 22 December and re-open at Woodburn at 9.30am, Tuesday 2 January.

The Casino, Woodburn and Evans Head visitor information centres will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day.

The Nammoona Waste and Resource Recovery and Evans Head and Rappville Waste Transfer Stations will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. Standard waste collection services will continue.

COUNCIL MATTERS

Council engaged Ardill Payne & Partners to develop a stormwater hydraulic model to study the impacts of stormwater flooding issues in Casino and the surrounding area.

Increased rain frequency, quantity, urban surface density and development have placed increasing pressure on the system, which was developed in the 1950s, and some areas of Casino are experiencing localised flooding from minor events.

The Casino Stormwater Flooding Mitigation Options Evaluation Report 2023 provided six mitigation options and consideration of improvements in the overland flow paths. Council resolved to undertake further detailed planning and investigations into the report's recommendations and actively explore funding for its implementation.

The second round of funding will open next year, and local community groups are encouraged to take advantage of this funding which Council provides annually.

IN BRIEF

WATER RESTRICTIONS DELAYED

Level One water restrictions are not expected before Christmas, as initially predicted, due to higher than anticipated rainfall in the region during November.

Drier than average conditions associated with El Nino negatively impacted the Northern Rivers' water supply in September and October 2023. However, recent rainfall during November and the forecast of further storm events mean that the need for water restrictions is now delayed.

Rainfall data and inflows into Rocky Creek Dam are being monitored with the dam currently at 84 percent capacity. Council will continue to advise the community of any changes or updates.

SPLASHFEST POSTPONED

Due to forecast inclement weather, the Splashfest event to held on Saturday 25 November a Coraki was postponed.

The new date for the event will be Saturday 20 January.

The free event, to be held at Windsor Park includes live music, markets, food trucks, children's entertainment and much more.

ANNUAL REPORT

This month Council was presented with the 2022-23 Annual Report outlining its achievements and progress for the previous year.

The 2022-2023 year was a landmark year for Richmond Valley Council as it continued to rebuild after the 2022 floods, with one of the largest ever infrastructure programs, including significant road reconstruction and asset repairs across the Richmond Valley. It shows that Council's longterm plan to help guide us through

the next three years of recovery is well on track.

The report also shows the return of events across the Richmond Valley, and Council has been proactive in helping to organise and support many events such as the Casino Truck Show and Christmas light-ups and street parties - which encourage not only the economic and tourist growth in our area but the reconnection of communities.

Council also finalised more than \$20m in signature projects, including completing Rappville Hall and Woodburn to Coraki Road upgrade with significant progress on the Casino pool upgrade, casino showground, and the Northern Rivers Rail Trail. Our focus for 2023 is to continue to advocate for our community and rebuild our infrastructure while planning for the future.

The place plans will include future options for housing, economic development and community facilities in Evans Head, Broadwater, Rileys Hill, Woodburn and Coraki.

They will also explore opportunities to build resilience against future flooding and adapt to a changing climate. Council is partnering with the NSW Reconstruction Authority to pilot a combined approach to place planning and adaptation planning for this project. This will help to ensure that these communities can remain safe and sustainable into the future.

Consultants Place Design Group, supported by Meridian Urban, have been appointed to undertake the project and they will be working directly with the Mid Richmond communities early next year. Details of consultation sessions will be published on Council's website and social media sites.

RAIL TRAIL WORKSHOP

Richmond Valley Council (RVC), in partnership with Lismore City Council (LCC), held its first Casino to Bentley Northern Rivers Rail Trail business engagement workshop at the Casino Golf Club on Thursday 9 November to bring together industry experts and entrepreneurs



to explore innovative strategies to capitalise on the Northern Rivers Rail Trail.

The workshop, facilitated by leading regional tourism expert Meredith Wray, attracted 30 participants, and provided a platform for attendees to engage in interactive discussions, gain valuable insights, and establish important networks.

The diverse range of topics covered during the event included an update on the Casino to Bentley section, discussion around creating rail trail experiences, and lessons from the business development program on the Tweed section, including an overview of the Connect Program.

Further workshops to assist businesses to identify ways to adapt their appeal to a new market, and to identify new opportunities, will be held in the new year.

Since the opening of the Tweed section in March, 108,829 have checked out the trail. On average, that's 16,329 visitors per month, 3726 people per week or 532 people daily.
