Assemble at 10am at the Coraki Hotel for march at 10.30am to cenotaph in Riverside Park for service.


**Evans Head Dawn Service**

The meetings are live streamed through Council's Facebook page, and available for viewing on Council's website.

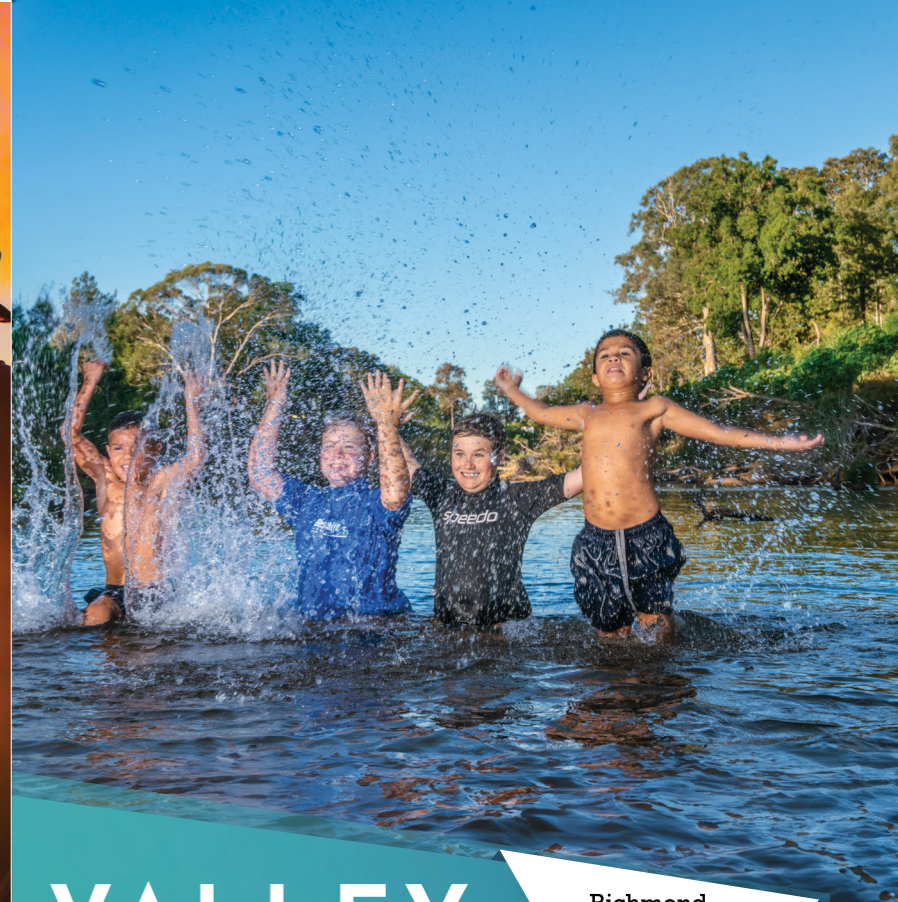

## ROADS UPDATE

Richmond Valley Council has continued its work restoring our road network.

Under the NSW Government Regional and Local Roads Repair Program, Council has heavy patched more than 25,000 square metres of roads across the Richmond Valley.

Council has completed heavy patching work on the following roads:

- Sextonville Rd 3,925 sq m.
- Casino Coraki Rd 7,229 sq m.
- Broad Water Evans Head Rd 2,421sq m.
- Woodburn Evans Head Rd 2,665.2 sq m.
- Spring Grove Rd 7,374 sq m

Asphalt work has also been completed on Colches and Barker St and McDonalds Bridge road.

Work is also due to start on Manifold Road.

Work continues on three bridge projects across the Richmond Valley at Willow Bridge, Reynolds Road Bridge and Lollback Bridge.

Motorists are asked to obey all signage and traffic direction at each work site.

## TOTEM POLES INSTALLED

Three totem poles which represent aspects of Evans Head have been installed on the foreshore.

Council was approached by the Evans Head Progress Association to commission a public artwork important to the area's identity.

Council engaged Broadwater sculptor Greg Bowering to complete an installation which drew attention to the opening of the Evans River between the north and south wall. Greg presented a proposal titled Memorial Totems. Greg partnered with well-known New Zealand sculptor Brett Sutherland to deliver the installation.

Rather than a centralised monument, this artwork consists of three individual totems, each representing different aspects of Evans Head. The main focus of the proposed totems was to capture the layered histories of Evans Head. The three totems commemorate the place, its cultural histories, significant events, and ancestries.

The sculptors have used animal-based metaphors such as the osprey, snapper and tiger prawn, as well as capturing the Bandjalang three brothers' story.

The totems now stand tall on the Evans Head foreshore, east of Cribb Reserve near the Riverfront Kiosk.



## NORTHERN RIVERS RAIL TRAIL OPENING SUCCESS

After 10 long years, Richmond Valley Council is thrilled to have opened the much-anticipated Casino to Bentley section of the Northern Rivers Rail Trail.

The ceremony took place at the Old Casino Station, marking the commencement of a new era in outdoor adventure and community connectivity.

Spanning 13.4kms through picturesque landscapes, and boasting an adjoining bridle trail for horse riding, the Casino to Bentley section offers opportunities for individuals and families to explore the region's natural beauty.

Whether riding, walking, running, cycling or simply strolling, this trail promises an enriching experience for all ages and fitness levels.

The journey includes seven bridges, changing rural landscapes and panoramic views from the rest area above the railway tunnel. The tunnel is home to a rare colony of microbats which will be carefully protected as part of the project.

The rail trail also includes a new car park and refurbishments to the Old Casino Station precinct, as well as parking and facilities at the Bentley end of the section, which will ultimately connect with the Lismore section.

This project was made possible with \$7.5 million in funding from the Australian Government's National Tourism Icons Program, administered by Austrade.

## CASINO SHOWGROUND AND RACECOURSE UPGRADE

The Casino Showground and Racecourse has reopened as a major hub for events in regional NSW, with a focus on horse-related activities and events.

The project received almost \$14.3 million in funding, with \$8.2m and \$4.6m received under the Australian and NSW governments' co-funded Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, and additional funding from the NSW Showground Stimulus Program, Drought Communities Funding, Crown Lands and Council, putting the facility on the map for equestrian activities and events.

The doors officially opened to reveal a large undercover arena, an outdoor sand area, a new racing stable complex to accommodate up to 80 horses, and a new truck and float parking area.

The new equestrian exercise area, which includes round yards, a horse walker and a 50-metre equine pool, will be a huge draw card for equestrians who can use it to improve the fitness of their horses.

Other work completed, such as the powered event camping area, will increase the facility's ability to host additional events including, country music festivals, car shows, trade shows and markets.

These events are expected to boost the local economy by attracting visitors from across NSW to stay in the Northern Rivers and spend money at businesses in the region.

Mayor Robert Mustow said the opening was a great occasion for the community to celebrate the showground's new beginning, and thanked the Australian and NSW governments for providing the funding to create such a marvellous facility.
