# **COUNCIL ELECTION**

The 2024 NSW Local Government Elections will take place on Saturday 14 September.

For more information visit the NSW Electoral Commission website, call 1300 135 736 for enrolment, voting and general enquiries or 1300 022 011 for political party, candidate enquiries, third party campaigner and political donor enquiries.

Richmond Valley Council is governed by seven councillors elected to represent the whole local government area - no wards or divisions exist. The mayor is popularly elected by voters. This method allows residents to directly choose their mayor through democratic election, via a separate ballot

Both the mayor and councillors are elected for a four-year term of office.

If you live outside the Richmond Valley local government area but own rateable property in the area, you are entitled to vote in local government elections. However, it is not compulsory to do so. Similarly, eligible occupiers and ratepaying lessees are also entitled to vote in council elections.

Unlike the residential roll, the non-residential roll is maintained by individual councils, not by the NSW Electoral Commission. Those interested in registering on the nonresidential roll must ensure their details are received by the General Manager prior to 6pm, Monday 5 August. Forms are available from Council's website.



With a \$30,000 grant from the NSW Government Community Building Partnerships program, Council will add more than \$125,000 to build seven shade sails over the area, creating a cooler, sun-safe area for play into the future.



# ENTRIES OPEN FOR CASINO TRUCK SHOW

The excitement continues to build for the 2024 North Coast Petroleum Casino Truck Show.

The Casino CBD will come to life on the morning of Saturday 3 August when the trucks roll through town from 10am in the annual street parade.

## RICHMOND VALLEY ROAD REPAIR PROGRAM CONTINUES

Daily users of McDonalds Bridge Road will be pleased to learn further improvement work will get underway in August, weather permitting.

More than \$2 million will be spent repairing around four kilometres of the road, which will involve widening the shoulders from the bottom of the hill east of Edenville Road to Stratheden Road. Once completed, the full width of the road will be resealed.

The project will also involve the widening and scour rock protection of culverts, the installation of guideposts and table drain cleaning.

Council continues to work in conjunction with the NSW and Australian governments to not only restore the road network, but build it back with more resilience with funding from all three tiers of government.

The floods of 2022 left our region with a road repair bill of more than \$100 million and, regrettably, our road network again came under considerable pressure over the past eight months with record levels of rainfall causing widespread pothole damage.

Council's upcoming capital works program recognises the key role our local roads and infrastructure play in building more resilient and connected communities, along with supporting economic growth in the Richmond Valley.

#### Hare Street Upgrade

The work to upgrade the section of Casino's Hare Street heading east to Coraki continues.

So far, the existing drainage has been fixed and reshaped and two additional culverts installed to improve drainage.

More than 2500t of material has been taken out of the Casino-bound lane and stabilised, with the Coraki lane work to begin.

The road will then be resealed, with work expected to be finished by late August, weather permitting.

#### Other work

Work at Willox Bridge and Lollback Creek bridge has been completed and both bridges are opened to traffic.

Reynolds Road bridge work is on track, with work to be finished by mid-September, weather permitting.

More than 9600 sq m of heavy patching has been completed on damaged pavement on Manifold Road.



## **BROADWATER AND TATHAM BRIDGE PROGRESS**

Progress is continuing on the upgrade of the bridges at Broadwater and Tatham.

The bridges have reduced 5t weight limits on them, and single lane access.

Council has released a tender to the market to secure a suitably qualified contractor for work on the Broadwater Bridge, and is in the final stage of the tendering process for work on the Tatham Bridges, which has generated a strong response from the market.

The Tatham Bridges project is funded by the Australian Government's Northern Rivers Recovery and Resilience Program.

The Broadwater Bridge is a shared asset with Lismore City Council, and Richmond Valley Council's contribution is funded from the NSW Government's Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

Council has also invested its own funds in the past year to produce a design so the project was shovel ready for grant opportunities.

The construction program for the Tatham Bridges is estimated to start in October and continue to December 2025.

The Broadwater Bridge construction program is estimated to start in March 2025 and continue through to August 2025.
